Authorized Activity #1. Description: Credit recovery and tutoring at Roosevelt High School.

Accredited and benchmark aligned high school course curriculum was purchased through the Woodburn School District. An after school credit recovery/tutoring program was offered at the Project Return Resource Center four days a week. Students were provided a snack and support with course curriculum. This curriculum was provided to all students at Roosevelt High School with emphasis on seniors who were credit deficient. For the school years 2003-04 and 2004-05 **52** students participated in Project Return's credit recovery program. **45** students received high school course credit. **6** students were able to graduate on time due to the credit recovery assistance. **7** students did not complete the course work for a variety of reasons.

Authorized Activity #2. Description: Liaisons assigned to all schools in PPS.

8.5 staff members were assigned to 93 regular schools and 22 alternative schools in the PPS attendance area. For the school year 2004-05, Project Return served **1,848** students, pre-K, and families. The liaisons gave support to the schools by assisting schools in enrolling students immediately. There is no evidence that any student in the PPS district was not enrolled in the school within 24 hours. Liaison provided schools supplies, **525** backpacks filled with school supplies and hygiene products to students.

130 students enrolled at Marshall High School, (2004-05). **116** continued in the same placement. **25** students graduated from Marshall High School. One student graduated with honors and had been homeless for her four years in high school.

Authorized Activity #8. Description: After school enrichment program at Chapman Elementary.

42, (school year 2004-05), **students** attended the after school enrichment program at Chapman Elementary. All goals were met and or exceeded for this program. **100%** of the students who attended the program for more than 3 months became readers and or made 1 year growth in reading. **100%** took the state tests and 95% met state benchmarks. **95%** of the students attended school 90% of the total days enrolled.

Authorized Activity #16. Description: Resource Center at Roosevelt High School.

241 students were identified at Roosevelt High School, 2004-05. **20** students dropped out. The resource center provided students with school supplies, hygiene products, clothing, a food pantry, washer and dryer and after school activities, (credit recovery, tutoring, and Friday afternoon movies).
